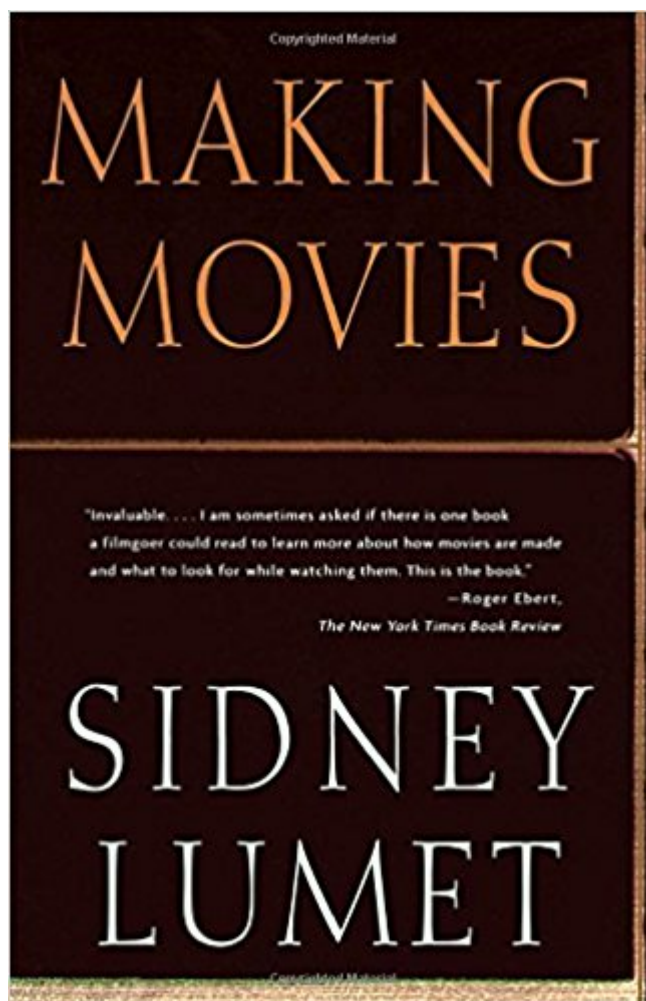

It's well known that a vast number of people work on any given movie in roles as varied as writing scripts, choosing locations, dressing sets, costuming the players, lighting scenes, manipulating the camera, directing actors, editing film, working on sound, advertising the finished product, and screening it to an audience. Have you ever thought about how these components are collated? Or why the director is most often considered the author of a film? Wonder no more, because Sidney Lumet's *Making Movies* is a terrific journey through each stage of filmmaking that is overseen by the director. This book is great for the aspiring filmmaker and seasoned industry veteran alike. I knocked off 1 star only because some of the technical processes of filmmaking described in the book are no longer used, and it made the book feel very dated. The writing is still great and it's nice to hear about how films used to be made. The techniques of working with actors still hold up, as well as the detailed descriptions of the director's role within the larger company of talent and executives. I highly recommend this book to anyone who wants to advance their cinema education and gain deep appreciation for the art form.

If you want a crash course in making movies from the best, this is the book for you. Lumet, one of the truly great directors, gives you a wealth of information about all aspects of film making. Only the sections on film processing are of limited value as digital photography is now the norm. But every aspect of film making, from directing, lighting, sound, etc. is covered and told in a easy, breezy style. Also includes some anecdotes about some of our greatest actors, like Newman, Brando, Hepburn and Connery. Highly recommended.

Very interesting stories about directing, along with a lot of advice for aspiring directors. Particularly good stuff about Dog Day Afternoon and how he had the actors use their real names in order to force them to identify with the characters. A careful read of this book will reveal why Lumet's films are for the most part great works. He has a really thoughtful and intelligent approach and it very much shows in the final product.

A great book about filmmaking by a successful director whose career spans decades of American Cinema and a lot of transformations : from the end of the Studio era to the revolution of the New Hollywood and finally the arrival of new technologies and possibilities. Lumet does not talk about cinema theory, he explains how he works to share an insider's view of what it is that goes on on a movie set, in an editing room, in the mix room and at the Hollywood meeting with the studio's president. He shares his tricks and technics without making them "the" example to follow but in order to explain how films are done or can be done. His writing is simple and clear, his respect for writers, composers and actors is clear throughout (and welcome). His humor is also a plus when it comes to talking about the California guys. Care for movies ? Filmmaking ? Read this one. It will not replace your FinalCut Pro CookBook but you will get some precise tips and a global view on filmmaking from script to DVD.
