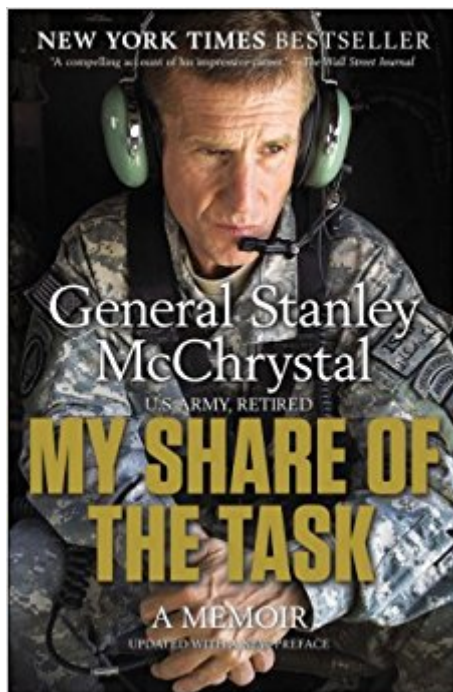


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My Share Of The Task: A Memoir

This memoir runs through the key events in General McChrystal's military career, but the most interesting sections, relevant in 2015, describe his leadership in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. Republicans and Democrats seem to agree that the Iraq war was a mistake, and that is arguably true. Nevertheless, the US military had figured out how to effectively win in Iraq and Afghanistan and keep the peace, which is a remarkably feat. You will gain insight into how this came to be under the "surge." You will better understand why some claim that pulling troops out later led to the current

chaos in Iraq, and has the potential to repeat in Afghanistan. The General does not address in any detail the two main controversies he was involved in (Pat Tilman and the Rolling Stone interview). He writes about the Commander in Chief in nothing but respectful language. If you are looking for more on these controversies, you will not find it, maybe not surprisingly. You will find insightful descriptions of how the military works, solves problems at a high level, and works with our diplomatic core and foreign allies. You will see how *good* our military really can be.

Remarkable book by a remarkable man who not only shares his experiences in Iraq and Afghanistan, but most importantly teaches the readers the life lessons he has learned in what makes a leader and the leadership qualities that are important for people of all walks of life. Stanley McChrystal is a humble, empathetic, compassionate man who cares about the lives of all people, whether his troops or the lives of Afghan and Iraqi civilians. He shares the various leadership qualities good and bad from those he has served alongside with and helps the reader take the journey with him through all the ups and downs of battle. As aforementioned, the leadership qualities that he has come to learn through both an intellectual grasp of history as well as those who served above him and with him enables the reader to become a more nuanced and appreciative person of the qualities important for our daily lives. *Highly recommended*.

This is a fine book written by a real hero and a great and very effective leader. I echo the comments of many other who praise this book and its author, but the book also tells some important truths about the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq.¹ The disbanding of the Iraqi army by J Paul Bremer created much of the conflict in Iraq, and the balance of it was created by Al Qaeda which had not been established in Iraq prior to the war but was drawn to it by American presence.² Although Al Qaeda had had haven in Afghanistan under the Taliban, by the time the author was in command there Al Qaeda had either been decimated or moved on to other places. During the author's relation of his time in command in Afghanistan, Al Qaeda barely merits a mention; it's all about the Taliban. The author was supremely effective in waging war, but his telling of the story seems to support the idea that mission creep had changed the focus from hunting down Al Qaeda to "nation building" in Afghanistan. Gen. McChrystal and his forces did extremely well at everything they did. Should we be spending our blood and terror on this effort is a separate question the answer to which is far less clear. This is a good read for those who want to know what actually happened. There villains in the story other than the Taliban and Al Qaeda, but you must read between the lines to find them. General McChrystal wisely avoids identifying them, but they emerge for a careful

reader.

This book is excellent. It has a little something for everything. The style of writing is great. The book flows like water from chapter to chapter. You will feel like you talked to the General personally after reading it. I think this will be one of the premier books on leadership and war. The reader will get a good summary of war at the largest levels. At that point the picture is different. You will learn a lot about the strategy for the war in both Iraq and Afghanistan. He is very detailed about the who, what, why, when of the conflict. What an amazing memory. The book also has some great insights to leadership. His style is inspirational just from reading it. His personal touch to things is very unique. You can also tell that he is a very passionate, and compassionate leader dedicated to country and mission. This guy walked a patrol in Afghanistan. There aren't many 4 stars that do that nowadays. I know everyone will want to read about the conflict with the President which filled the papers. There is only a few pages of that conflict. Most of the book material in the book is about the war. Through those examples and stories I think the nonmilitary person will gain from it.

This is an outstanding book on effective leadership principals. It's not about leadership theory, but practical, real-life examples during two dangerous wars against terrorist organizations. I think it's a must reader for young leaders. I love the fact that General McChrystal didn't take a political position; it's not another "Tell All" novel. He's an engaging leader who cares about this team. He wants their input from all levels. This is usual for military leaders. General McChrystal is a commissioned officer who valued non-commissioned officers (NCO) input and services. As an old NCO, I would have loved to serve under General McChrystal's command. Although this book was written about our military campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan, it's real about leadership principals that can be applied in any organization. I love the General's view and study of military history. I also loved his approach to his job, his commitment to family and his dedication to stay in shape. I'm now getting up every day at 5:30 am and working out because the General is up and running at 4:30 am. In summary, an outstanding book on leadership, a detailed view of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, and valuable insights on the working of the military and its working relationship with other governmental organizations.

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
