

Building The Golden Gate Bridge: A Workers' Oral History





Synopsis

Moving beyond the familiar accounts of politics and the achievements of celebrity engineers and designers, Building the Golden Gate Bridge is the first book to primarily feature the voices of the workers themselves. This is the story of survivors who vividly recall the hardships, hazards, and victories of constructing the landmark span during the Great Depression. Labor historian Harvey Schwartz has compiled oral histories of nine workers who helped build the celebrated bridge. Their powerful recollections chronicle the technical details of construction, the grueling physical conditions they endured, the small pleasures they enjoyed, and the gruesome accidents some workers suffered. The result is an evocation of working-class life and culture in a bygone era. Most of the bridge builders were men of European descent, many of them the sons of immigrants. Schwartz also interviewed women: two nurses who cared for the injured and tolerated their antics, the wife of one 1930s builder, and an African American ironworker who toiled on the bridge in later years. These powerful stories are accompanied by stunning photographs of the bridge under construction. An homage to both the American worker and the quintessential San Francisco landmark, Building the Golden Gate Bridge expands our understanding of Depression-era labor and California history and makes a unique contribution to the literature of this iconic span.

Great, the building crew's own stories.

This relatively brief book has everything you could want from a piece of history. The workers' voices, based on interviews the author conducted, come through with their individuality and and uniqueness intact, making the reading experience like time travel back to the 1930s. You'll see with new eyes, the magnitude of the project, the uncertain odds of success, and most of all, the sheer danger of working on those towers, cables and scaffolds suspended hundreds of feet above a churning passage to the sea. Many of the men had also worked on the Bay Bridge, where an accidental death every two months was simply expected, so they uniformly appreciated that the Gate was the

first major project in the US to have a safety net below the work area and to require that hard hats be worn. Nonetheless, roughly a dozen still lost their lives. It's also clear to each one how lucky they were to have jobs, and good-paying jobs at that, when so many others didn't. Yet almost to a person, none of them thought at first that the bridge was anything more than a boondoggle, and assumed it could never actually be built, yet work was work, and badly needed. The remarkable technology involved comes through beautifully as well, though it helps a great deal with that to read the chapters in order. At one voice per chapter, it may seem tempting to skip around and find the most colorful characters, but don't. The author has cleverly sequenced the material to tell the story on several levels at the same time, so just give yourself over to the experience. If you've ever driven across the Golden Gate, or walked across, or merely admired it from a distance or in photos, this book is a must-read.
