

Here is my review for the five Elements First Grade Geography Series 1st Grade Books. I went over this book with the following ages, 5, 6 8. 10 and 11. I felt that the book had things for all of them to learn. I did feel that the book was very basic, but it did keep all of the kids interested. Personally I felt that this book left me wanting more. I have read other books by this author and loved them. I can say I was disappointed with the illustrations as they were not as amazing some of the other books that I have read. I think illisrations are impornat at this age as it helps keeps the kids attention to the book. As for the book, I can say that the book itself is eighteen pages, but of those eighteen pages only five of them have any real information. The five pages have very basic information about the

elements. For each element there is a title page, with very short information on it. I understand the book is for first graders, but I feel that they could handle a lot more information than what is presented. Overall this is a good introduction of material. It contains very simple information which makes it easy enough to use with young children and it will not overwhelm them. I personally used this book as an interdiction for the little kids, and a refresher for the older ones. I will follow up this book with another one that will contain more information, something that will go a little more in depth with the elements.I received this e-book for free in exchange for my honest review.

This ebook on the five elements is an illustrated introduction to the Chinese idea of Wu Xing, without saying as much. It is not the same five elements as in $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A}\infty$ The Fifth Element $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A} \cdot$ nor is it the same 5 as $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A}\infty$ Captain Planet $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A} \cdot$. These ones are Fire, Water, Earth, Wood and Metal. As I said, the book states nothing about the concept of $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A}\infty$ The Five Elements $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A} \cdot$, so without further research, to most western children, this is going to just be a jumble of interesting pictures. It is in Speedy Publishing $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A} \hat{A}^{TM}$ s $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A}\infty$ First Grade $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A} \hat{A} \cdot$ series, and I think it might be a tad abstract for that age. I $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A} \hat{A}^{TM}$ m sure, however, that in more eastern culture, this is a logical point to discuss. The pictures themselves are great. They depict the title element well and often with great clarity. There are three pictures for each element. None are obviously photo-shopped or rendered. The facts are a little more ambiguous. They still include interesting detail, but in just describing the textbook definition of the element, it seems to lose the purpose of the 5 as a whole. I

believe the Earth topic is completely off the mark, as it describes the planet as a whole and not necessarily earth as in soil. They are also out of order compared to the Chinese systems which use these elements. The principle of Wu Xing is used widely in ancient culture to describe balance, creation and destruction. These ideas can apply to $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A} \phi a$ wide array of phenomena, from cosmic cycles to the interaction between internal organs, and from the succession of political regimes to the properties of medicinal drugs $\tilde{A}\phi \hat{A}$ $\hat{A} \bullet$ to directly quote Wikipedia on the topic. This one is an interesting book, but I would advise against letting young readers read this one without a discussion afterward or direct involvement of a more knowledgeable person on the subject.
