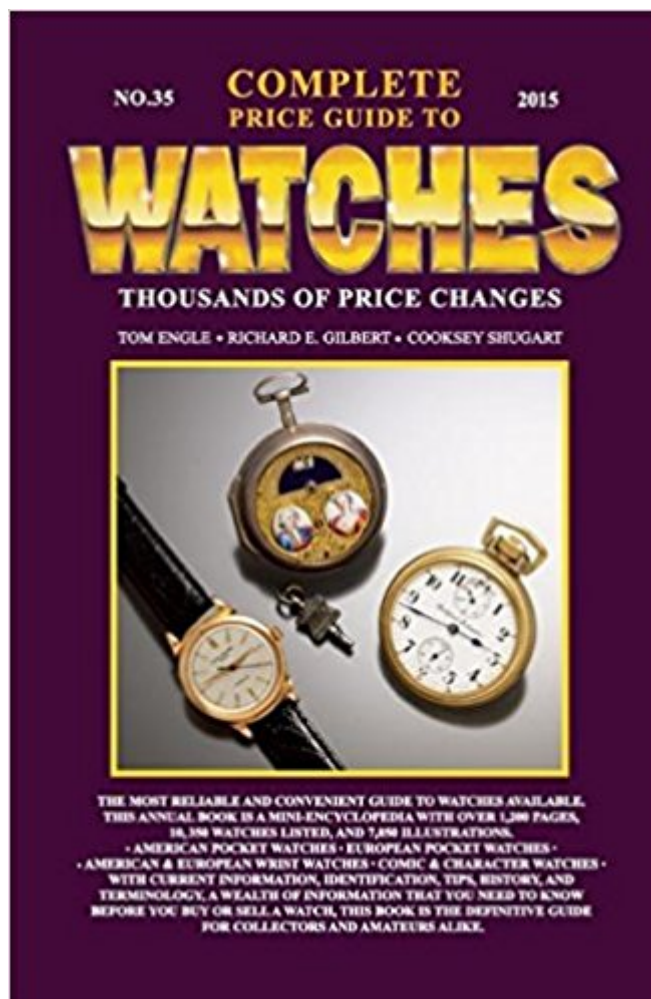


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# The Complete Price Guide To Watches

They have searched for fine timepieces throughout the world and are the foremost experts in the field of antique horology. Tom Engle lives in Louisville, KY and Richard Gilbert lives in Sarasota, FL. Cooksey Shugart lived in Cleveland, TN. He passed away in 2013.

The title is deceptive in that it is nowhere near informing anyone of the price of watches for the year of 2017 as stated. It is a book that is very informative as to the history of watches, especially railroad watches and their history and certain watch companies, some that are out of business now but as a source for pricing information. As far as pricing information of today's watches it fails miserably. There are common and popular watches that are NOT EVEN MENTIONED in this large volume. An example is the newer watches of both Rolex and Omega are not there or even mentioned! I think the Bond Seamasters and Planet Oceans and Rolex Submariners should be there! I am keeping it for the historical information and guidance but that is NOT why I purchased the book. The watches I was interested in were not even there. Also, there is no mention of any Asian companies such as Seiko, Citizen or the like. Very disappointed. But if you want to know about railroad watches at the turn of the 1900's then this is your book.

A truly insane amount of information in this book! Very much worth the money. Have used it a few times, and it looks great on the shelf when I'm not. Very happy with this book.

Time honored for over 20 years this annual publication accurate and up to the minute value guide and watch identifier is a must have for novices and seasoned collectors of mainly US manufacture antique pocket watches. It also does a creditable job of identifying European pocket watches and world sourced wrist watches. The authors not only help identify watch grades but also provide interesting historical data of manufactures and the evaluation of watches over the centuries and how vital accurate time keeping became for industry, governments and work place safety.

It is now easier to evaluate watches for sale, and there is a lot of information about how they work

and also their history. I think the book is well worth the price. My only complaint would be that the pictures of pocket watch movements are often of poor quality, as if they've been copied repeatedly.

This book literally has thousands of watches, but unfortunately there has been a few watches that my father has gotten that he cannot reference because they are not in there. It would have been nice if the pictures were in color and if they had a better description.
