

Non-Governmental Organizations And Development (Routledge Perspectives On Development)





Synopsis

Non-governmental organizations (NGOs) are high profile actors in the field of international development, both as providers of services to vulnerable individuals and communities and as campaigning policy advocates. This book provides a critical introduction to the wide-ranging topic of NGOs and development. Written by two authors with more than A A twenty years experience of research and practice in the field, the book combines a critical overview of the main research literature with a set of up-to-date theoretical and practical insights drawn from experience in Asia, Europe, Africa and elsewhere. It highlights the importance of NGOs in development, but it also engages fully with the criticisms that the increased profile of NGOs in development now attracts. Non-Governmental Organizations and Development begins with a discussion of the wide diversity of NGOs and their roles, and locates their recent rise to prominence within broader histories of struggle as well as within the ideological context of neo-liberalism. It then moves on to analyze how interest in NGOs has both reflected and informed wider theoretical trends and debates within development studies, before analyzing NGOs and their practices, using a broad range of short case studies of successful and unsuccessful interventions. David Lewis and Nazneen Kanji then moves on to describe the ways in which NGOs are increasingly important in relation to ideas and debates about $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a}$ $\neg \tilde{E}$ ∞ civil society $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a}$ $\neg \hat{a}$, ϕ , globalization and the changing ideas and practices of international aid. The book argues that NGOs are now central to development theory and practice and are likely to remain important actors in development in the years to come. In order to appreciate the issues raised by their increasing diversity and complexity, the authors conclude that it is necessary to deploy a historically and theoretically informed perspective. This critical overview will be useful to students of development studies at undergraduate and masters levels, as well as to more general readers and practitioners. The format of the book includes figures, photographs and case studies as well as reader material in the form of summary points and questions. Despite the growing importance of the topic, no single short, up-to-date book exists that sets out the main issues in the form of a clearly written, academically-informed text: until now.

An anthropologist by background, he is co-author with Katy Gardner of Anthropology, Development and the Postmodern Challenge (Pluto, 1996), and author of The Management of

As a previous reviewer noted, there are few presentations of numbers as data, and some mission areas are not emphasized. That being said, I have looked long and far for a better survey book on the nature of NGOs that do international development and the cross-cutting sets of issues that they confront -- and create. There is not a better book available on this topic. This subject matter covers a broad terrain; a lot of work goes into assembling all this into a survey text. In terms of the breadth and thoroughness of coverage, these authors have done a good job. Although the authors are well anchored in academic contexts, they also write from strong credentials in the field. This is not "made up" stuff from the towers of academe. Readers should note that David Lewis has authored a separate book that focuses more specifically on managing NGOs. The present book is essentially a survey book about NGOs -- describing them and the contexts in which they operate -- rather than on how to manage them. The only nudge I might give the authors is to update the book. A number of changes have occurred since 2009. I would gladly purchase an updated version.

Excellent. Well written, informative and compelling!

Fairly broad review, but also fairly academic. It details certain kinds of NGO activity (e.g. health and humanitarian), but doesn't cover some important cross-cutting NGO's (i.e. those at play across many sectors such as environmental). At times it seems to avoid any objective measures or data in favor of word-smithed description.
