


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East Of The Mississippi: Nineteenth-Century American Landscape Photography





Synopsis

An important reconsideration of landscape photography in 19th-century America, exploring crucial but neglected geographies, practitioners, and themes Although pictures of the West have dominated our perception of 19th-century American landscape photography, many photographers were working in the eastern half of the United States during that period. Their pictures, with the exception of Civil War images, have received relatively scant attention. Redressing this imbalance is East of the Mississippi, the first book to focus exclusively on the arresting eastern photographs that helped shape Americaâ [™]s national identity. Celebrating natural wonders such as Niagara Falls and the White Mountains as well as capturing a cultural landscape fundamentally altered by industrialization, these works also documented the impact of war, promoted tourism, and played a role in an emerging environmentalism. This is the only record of a phenomenal show at The National Gallery which closes in mid July. After that, to see it, you must go to New Orleans where it will be up through 2017. That's it, where else could you savor these very important and historic images. Another review has noted the reproductions here do not do justice to the actual images. Obviously true... no way to compare to seeing them in person but this comes close for a small cost. Yes, subtleties of sometimes delicate impressions do not reproduce well in a few cases, what's the alternative, to not see them at all. Here is a record of early graphic images, created by people working in a completely new medium, learning to deal with available light and exposures. Consider what they had to do to make these images, how difficult it was to travel to locations, set up primitive equipment, experiment with creating plates and processing, no immediate feedback on the result of their efforts. Extraordinary.

After viewing a really great show at the National Gallery, we went to the bookstore / gift shop to buy the catalog. What a crushing disappointment!! Nearly all of the images have a yellow cast that was not present in the images in the exhibit, One of my favorite image from the show was by Hawes, This cool-toned winter view, shot through a lattice of snow-covered limbs and twigs, had been transformed into a hackneyed cliche by digitally transforming it into a "sepia-toned" piece of dreck. Most of the other images suffered a similar fate.One wonders if the art director for this book saw the show at all!
