

"Libraries may own books dealing with transgender adults, but this is the only guide about raising transgender children. While the general message to parents is that "you have nothing to apologize for and nothing to be embarrassed about," the authors make it clear that parents and families will

not have it easy. Realistic and empowering. Background: What do you do when it's Grandma's birthday dinner and your eight-year-old son insists on wearing his dress and Mary Janes? And how do you handle dating when your transgirl daughter still has male sex organs? Brill (founder, Gender Spectrum Education and Training) and Pepper (coordinator, LGBT studies, Yale Univ.) bring solid credentials and years of research to help parents and others deal with issues specific to transgender children. Answers may not be easy, but blaming the child, denying access to transgender friends, and verbal threats are not helpful. When parents recognize their child's gender identity, there can be feelings of confusion, anger, shock, fear, shame, and grief. Most children have gender identities by age two or three; like homosexuality, being transgender is not a choice. Nor is it, as it has often been labeled, "acting out" in anger against parents. This book is truly wonderful. It has all the basic information that folks need to know to understand the concept of transgender kids, but also goes into depth and provides specific strategies for dealing with the host of issues and problems that transkids and their parents, families, and friends have to address. As the parent of a transkid myself, this was my first major resource to gather

information and understanding, and I have ordered more than a dozen copies over the past several years to give to teachers, principals, afterschool program supervisors, family members, and friends who needed to understand the big picture. This book is essential for anyone who needs to know more themselves, or who needs to educate others to help protect and support trans children.

Part of me wishes this book were called "Kids and Gender: How Not To Screw Them Up." I've been interested in the possibilities of raising kids apart from society's strict and limiting "blue is for boys, pink is for girls" scripts since before I even had kids, and now that I do I have found surprisingly few resources, especially about raising boys. This book has excellent advice about parenting in our modern world and how to listen to and appreciate our kids' openness about gender. Yes, it also has a lot of specifics for families dealing with gender-variant and transgender/cross-gender kids, but I genuinely think there is something here to benefit ANY parent, caregiver, teacher, therapist, principal, pediatrician, etc who confronts and finds problematic the way our society stamps gender on kids based on their anatomy. An excellent read, and one I will go back to and purchase for others.
