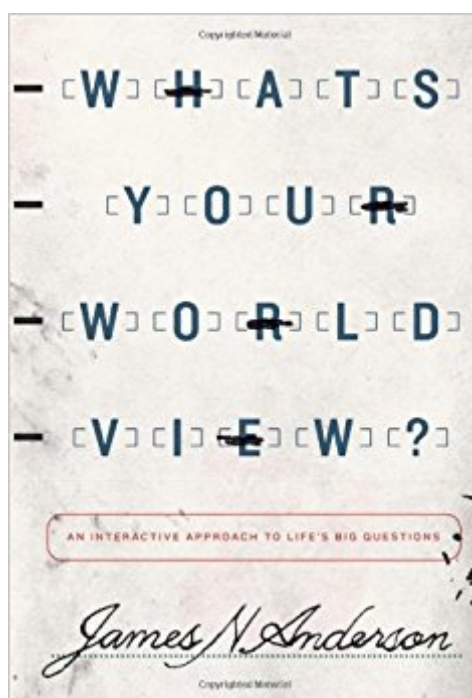

James N. Anderson (PhD, University of Edinburgh) is associate professor of theology and philosophy at Reformed Theological Seminary in Charlotte, North Carolina, and an ordained minister in the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. Anderson is a member of the Society of Christian Philosophers, the British Society for the Philosophy of Religion, and the Evangelical Philosophical Society.

Point: Your worldview is the lens through which you see and interpret everything, and that is a big enough reason to question whether you have the correct worldview or not.

Path: Anderson takes his readers through a “Choose your own adventure” evaluation of truth, questions, and worldviews. In this journey he asks questions in order to point out difficulties and advantages to each way of viewing life, death, and the purpose of existence. At the end of the book he gives an evaluation of each worldview and an appendix which takes the reader to the “what’s next” questions.

Sources: In order to keep his book readable and engaging, Anderson purposely does very little with footnotes. However, this does not mean that the book doesn’t engage with others. This short book is a

great springboard into being intellectually honest with ourselves. Agreement: I enjoyed this book. Its simple, yet worldview-rattling, message was something that greatly appealed to me. There are many people who I plan on recommending this book to. Personal App: Am I thinking and acting consistent with my worldview? Remember those rock identification keys where you answered some questions and eventually found out that you were holding a piece of schist, or granite, or whatever? Anderson has put together a set of questions designed to back you into discovering your worldview or philosophy of life. Most of us hold contradictory views, and don't want to push them to their logical ends. If you follow Anderson, you can't hide from that. He is a Christian, and his explanations of the questions and the implications of their answers reflects that worldview. I don't agree with some of what he says are the implications of the non-Christian worldviews. But I did enjoy and appreciate the logical sequence of the questions and thinking them through in their starkest form. Worth the half hour you'll spend on it. You might also enjoy Julian Baggini's *Do You Think What You Think You Think*, which asks questions to expose the contradictions in and implications of your worldview - but does not have a particular worldview to advocate.

If you're not sure if you're a pantheist, a theist, an atheist, Christian, Muslim or Jew, this book will help you. You answer a few opening questions, and like a "Choose your own adventure" story, this book takes you to the logical landing point, indicating what your world-view might be. The accounts of each world-view seem fair and clear, but if you're looking for details and a definitive defense of

each, it's best to find something else. This book is for absolute beginners in the search for spirituality, but it includes a lot of worldviews, ranging from polytheism, to idealistic atheism. There were a few I'd never heard of. If you have no clue, this book will give you one. If you already have a clue, and are looking for a more expansive look at various world-views, this book will feel as if you're wading in a shallow bath-tub.

Pagans come in many forms, from the "almost Christian" Pelagian to the irrational relativist. The apologist must know the enemy to fulfill the command to take every thought captive. "What's your Worldview" is a handy, but too brief guide, to recognize the worldviews of those he will encounter in the wild, and expose their flaws and self-contradictions.

Really a great book for the learned or less so---they comprise all that is necessary to understand the worldviews out there and why a theistic one is the best choice. I greatly recommend its format which allows you to follow your own view--eg,atheistic to its ultimate conclusion and validity if such exists.Hope you ll get it to see where you fit in.Very readable for all ages.
