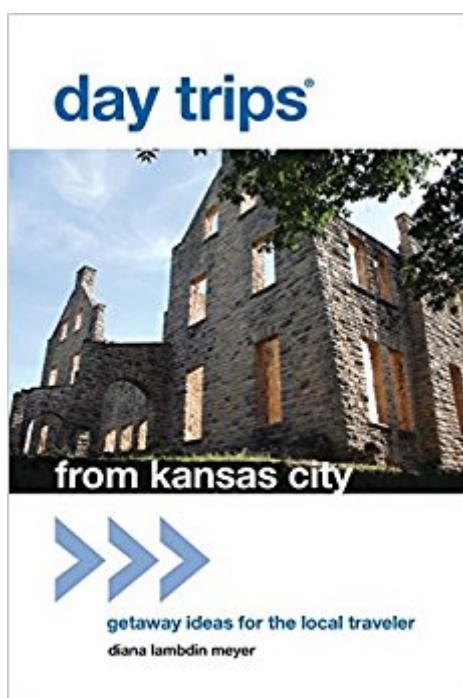

If you have even minimal knowledge of Kansas or Missouri outside of KC, or how to pick a spot on a map and use a search engine, skip this book. This book could be useful as a way to randomly pick a destination...but so could a web search. Or asking friends. Try the *Atlas Obscura* for out of the way spots too. I really don't like tour guides that were published years ago that recommend places to shop and eat. To me this is a waste as I frequently don't have the same interests as the author(s) and these places may be out of business or have gone downhill since the book was published. Ask a local for a recommendation on restaurants or, again, do an internet search. You'll find newer restaurants that way too. This book, of course, tells me places to shop and eat, making roughly half the material in this useless to me. If you have small, not interested in spending the day in the car and visiting a museum type kids, this is probably not the book for you. If you like reading short descriptions of places you might like in a book and then still looking up the current hours/admission price online, this could be the book for you. At best though, this is a starting point for your trip. Perhaps it's real use is having it in the car so you can see what else is around when you go somewhere and you don't want to use your phone.
